JPUH art event

Three of our Level 3 Art and Design students were invited to take part in an event organised by the corporate head nurse of The James Paget University Hospital – Tracie Bitters. The event was to award nurses that have just completed a qualification to become professional nurse advocates. The Professional Nurse Advocates (PNA) programme delivers training and restorative supervision for nurses across England. The programme launched in March 2021, towards the end of the third wave of COVID-19. Last month saw the first cohort of professional nurse advocates at the James Paget University Hospital awarded their certificates and pin badges by Dame Ruth May, Chief Nursing Officer England.

As the event took place, students Ella Scott, Caelan Sutherland and Hannah Moore worked live on a large-scale artwork responding to conversations and key words being discussed within the room, turning them into an illustrative mind map. This mind map is to be framed and hung in a prominent place within the hospital.





Lighthouse Club visit

Apprentices at both of our campuses were visited by Rob from the Lighthouse Club/Lighthouse Construction Industry Charity.

Rob spoke to our apprentices about overcoming the stigma associated with mental health, the value of speaking out and talking and how to access help from the Lighthouse Club. This was a valued session by all who attended.



VENI vegan food demonstration

Stewart Battrick from the Visitor Economy Network Initiative project organised a vegan food demonstration hosted by external chef Haley MacDonald. Haley owns her own vegan local business called Nuts about Plants. Joining her on the day were students from the Level 2 and 3 Professional Cookery courses, the year one Hospitality and Catering course and Apprenticeship Production Chefs, as well as senior chefs from two external companies. Throughout the demonstration, Haley introduced students to the various types of 'mylks,' cheeses and sour cream options available as an alternative dairy choice and showed the simple yet effective steps to create them, which students were able to make and taste for themselves.

The session turned out to be a brilliant success, as the students were keen to learn more about healthier ways to produce dairy-free meals and are looking forward to a future session with Haley.

Maritime Museum trip

A group of Level 2 Art and Design students enjoyed an exclusive trip to the Maritime Museum and the historic Net Drying racks. The visit supported the development of their local knowledge of the fishing industry, linked to a project they are currently completing for the Town Hall designing material based on Lowestoft's past.





Child Criminal Exploitation and County Lines

What is Child Criminal Exploitation?

Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE) is where an individual or group uses their position of power to take advantage of a child or young person under the age of 18 and coerces, controls, manipulates or deceives them into criminal activity.

This could be:

- In exchange for something the victim needs or wants such as money, clothes, mobile phones
- For the financial gain or other advantage of the perpetrator or facilitator
- Through violence or the threat of violence

CCE involves children and young people being exposed to, and/or being a victim of: physical and emotional violence, going missing, sexual abuse, sexual grooming and exploitation, modern day slavery and human trafficking.

Even if the activity appears to be consensual, the victim may have been criminally exploited. CCE does not always involve physical contact, it can also happen through use of technology. This could include making contact through social media and posting videos on YouTube which glamorise gang violence, drug taking and knife crime, as well as using and making music videos to make threats to other young people.

What is County Lines?

Crimestoppers describe County Lines as a term used for organised illegal drug-dealing networks, usually controlled by a person using a single telephone number, or 'deal line'. Serious organised criminals, often from big cities, recruit vulnerable children and adults, often in rural and suburban areas, as 'runners' to transport drugs and cash all over the country, often using the rail network or taxis and other private hire vehicles, so that the criminals behind it can remain detached and less likely to be detected. Most victims end up feeling 'trapped' in this criminal underworld, experiencing violence, intimidations, and threats. https://crimestoppers-uk.org/keeping-safe/community-family/county-lines

The young people used in County Lines to move and sell the drugs are being criminally exploited by others.

Signs of exploitation are:

- Presenting with physical injuries and or refusal to seek/receive medical treatment
- In possession of large amounts of unexplained money
- Expressing aggressive or intimidating views towards other groups of young people (some of whom may have been friends in the past)
- Multiple mobile phones/frequent change of phone number
- Frequently missing or missing for periods of time
- New clothes/trainers
- Travelling around a lot train tickets/seen in taxis regularly/being seen in cars (often hire cars), possibly with unknown adults, on a regular basis
- Associating with peers who are involved/suspected to be involved in gang related activity
- Refuses/scared to enter certain areas
- Drug related or violent offending involving weapons
- Being subject to threats, blackmail, violence, rape and sexual abuse
- Being forced to commit crimes

Child Criminal Exploitation and County Lines continued...

If you have concerns:

- · Stay calm
- Talk to your child and LISTEN to them. Let them know your concerns, but allow them to answer freely. Do not lecture.

.

- Make time for one to one conversations away from distractions.
- Be aware of what your child is doing and who their friends are.
- · Highlight the reality of county lines, using news stories and social media.
- · Monitor the use of their phone and internet, discourage regular use and reduce 'screen time'.
- Encourage them to get involved with positive activities. Consider local organisations such as sports clubs, cadets and youth groups.
- Establish and encourage core 'family time', such as eating meals together.
- · Speak with the College and other parents to share your experience and seek guidance
- Seek advice and assistance from local organisations

Further Advice and Support:

- Call 999 if there is immediate danger to someone, crime is in progress, you need police help immediately, someone is using violence or threatening violence, serious damage is or could be caused to property, a potential criminal has been disturbed or stopped

Updates from the Careers team this month include: Careers Week revisited, talking to your teen about Careers and a look towards future events.

National Careers Week, March 6th - 10th.

March saw us celebrate all things careers related. Check out our social media pages for an insight to our Careers Team, the career journeys of some of our staff and information about next steps from all our courses at East Coast College and Lowestoft Sixth Form. The National Careers week website has links to lots of information, but downloading the <u>Parents Guide</u> is a great place to start. Talking to your Teen about Careers.

Is your young person coming to the end of their college journey and not sure of their options, or have finished their first year and have questions about what options they have? 48% of young people 18-24 feel their family were the most important influence on their choices and more influential than teachers, friends and social media – so how do you know what you need to know to help explore all the options? April 19th: Crime and Justice Careers Fair. Being held across all sites this broad event will host companies that are involved in supporting people on both sides of the Criminal Justice System including Fraud Investigation, the Police and Prison Service, Prison education and Probation as well working for charities, local government and even locksmiths and security.

April 26th (East Coast College Lowestoft and Lowestoft Sixth Form) 2pm-7pm and April 27th (East Coast College Great Yarmouth) Higher Education Fairs:

We will be joined by 20 universities at both sites so students and parents will be able to talk to the universities directly and start exploring their options as we get ready for the 2024 application window to start. There will also be information about Higher and Degree Level Apprenticeships for those considering alternatives to university or making sure there is an all important Plan B.

May 3rd and 4th: Destination Support Event is aimed at students moving on from college and those still unsure of destinations, help will be on hand from the careers team, college and local Apprenticeships teams, The Princes Trust, Inspire Support, Access Community Trust as well as local employers and universities together with support around CVs, applications and interviews.

May 16th: UCAS application opens. Students will be able to explore and make early university applications and research their options.
